

KNOW HOW TO GET OUT

It is important to know how to evacuate your home in case of emergency. Draw a basic floor plan of your house in the area below. Show at least two possible exits. Make sure you practice evacuating your house with your family every 6 months.



KNOW WHERE TO GO

Depending on the type of emergency, you and your family might need to plan on several meeting places. You will also need to take into account that your family may not all be together when an emergency happens.

Outside your home

If the emergency is a house fire or some other event causing your home to be unsafe to inhabit, then your gathering place should be outside your home, but at a safe distance (for example, big tree in yard, end of driveway).

Neighbor's House

It is a good idea to designate a neighbor's house as a gathering place, especially in case you are not all together.
