## Production report for July 2014

Shelton Petroleum's total oil production in July 2014 amounted to 27,710 barrels, equivalent to 894 barrels per day.

Ukrnafta, Ukraine's largest oil and gas company, owns the remaining 55%. The production data in the table above represents Shelton Petroleum's working interest.
